

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#### **FESTIVAL OF HYMNS**

The Southern Arizona Chapter of the American Guild of Organists presents a Festival of Hymns on Sunday, February 22, at 4:00 p.m. at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, 1200 North Campbell Avenue. Based on the new worship resource Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the festival will showcase familiar hymns as well as three newly composed hymns, notably a setting of a new hymn text by Susan Palo Cherwien entitled "Rise, O Church, Like Christ Arisen." Dr. Paul Westermeyer, Professor of Church Music, Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota, will conduct, and Drs. Norene Walters and Kenneth Kelley will serve as organists. The afternoon will also feature brass quintet and timpani; the Jubilate Ringers, a handbell choir directed

by Dr. Rosella Duerksen; and a choir composed of representatives from Tucson's many church choirs. The festival celebrates hymn singing's historic roles: hymns are a part of worship, tools for theological instruction, a means to identity formation, and records of past spiritual experiences of the believing community. As Dr. Westermeyer says, choirs and congregations "voice the sung word in response to the Incarnate word." We celebrate what we believe through the music of hymns.

The public is cordially invited to attend. A freewill offering will be collected.

#### **Dr. Paul Westermeyer**

Paul Westermeyer has worked with the music of choirs and congregations since his high school days. To use his words, "They voice the sung word in response to the Incarnate word." He came to Luther in 1990 to implement and direct the Master of Sacred Music (MSM) program. One of only a few such degree programs in the country, the MSM helps musicians in the church refine their craft and simultaneously study the theological foundations of their work. Students study music at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, and theology at Luther.

A musician-theologian, Westermeyer majored in music at Elmhurst College, did his M.Div. at Lancaster Seminary, his M.S.M. at Union Theological Seminary in New York and his Ph.D. in church history at the University of Chicago. He served as choirmaster for congregations in Illinois, New Jersey, Maryland and Pennsylvania, and chaired the Music Department at Elmhurst College in Illinois. His book,

Te Deum: The Church and Music, is an historical analysis of the church's encounter with music from the Old Testament to the present. Other books include The Church Musician, With Tongues of Fire, and Let Justice Sing: Hymnody and Justice.

Westermeyer says that "religious communities approach music differently because they have different theological mindsets. For example, the prophetic punch a Lutheran congregation might give 'A Mighty Fortress Is Our God' is quite different from the more priestly pull a Roman Catholic community might give a chant based on the Kyrie."

The sacred music program has proved more popular and more ecumenical than Westermeyer had anticipated. Luther Seminary's MSMs have come from seven different countries and eleven different denominational groups. They form the nucleus of the chapel's musicians and the Schola Cantorum, the Seminary's choir, which is open to all students, faculty, staff and their spouses.

## Workshop with Dr. Paul Westermeyer Congregational Song: Neither "Traditional" nor "Contemporary"

Church musicians and clergy often find themselves caught in "worship wars" between advocates of what is called "traditional" and "contemporary" church music. The Rev. Dr. Paul Westermeyer will suggest that this dichotomy points to the empire's categories, but not the church's. In this informal colloquy, Westermeyer will explore with worship leaders and church musicians a better way.

Westermeyer is currently on sabbatical from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Min-

nesota, the largest seminary in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). During his sabbatical he is writing the Companion for Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the new, primary worship book of the ELCA. Westermeyer is getting acquainted with this book of worship, has written about materials like it from Lutheran and other traditions, and will seek to unpack the church's rich resources to which all such books points us.

#### Organ a la Carte Sunday February 15

This popular series at St. Philips in the Hills Episcopal Church continues on Sunday February 15 with a recital by **Dr. Jeffrey Campbell.** In honor of the Mendelssohn anniversary year (the 200th anniversary of his birth) Jeffrey will perform the large-scale Sonata No 1 in f minor. This is one of a set of six sonatas (really suites) that Mendelssohn composed and performed himself on tours of England and Germany. They successfully unite Mendelssohn's lyrical gifts, with virtuoso displays for hands and feet. Dr. Campbell will also perform works by J.S. Bach that were performed by Mendelssohn himself at a celebrated recital at Bach's own church in Leipzig in 1829. Courtyard refreshments begin at 12:30 p.m., with the recital beginning at 12:45 p.m., and lasting about 45 minutes. Admission is free, with donations accepted to help cover the cost of refreshments.

#### A Valentine Concert Sunday February 15

Sunday afternoon, February 15, 2009, the Women of St. Mark's Presbyterian Church present "A Valentine Concert," a program honoring Alan Schultz --- Orchestra Conductor, Master Organist, Choral Director, Composer, Poet. A long-time member of the Southern Arizona Chapter of the AGO, Alan has been for many years a major presence in Tucson's sacred music, amateur choral and orchestral music scenes. He is St. Mark's Music Director Emeritus. He is the former music director both of the Tucson Masterworks Chorale as well as of the Southern Arizona Symphony Orchestra. During the program February 15 he will play the pipe organ, performing many of his own compositions (including selections from his recently completed magnum opus "Twenty-four Preludes and Fugues in All Keys for Organ"). He will also reminisce about his music career and read some of his own poetry. The program begins 3:00 p.m., at St. Mark's Presbyterian Church, 3809 E. Third St., Tucson. Admission free – but donations will be accepted for the work of The Haven and Casa de Palmas.
