Doug Leightenheimer

Doug Leightenheimer, who serves on our chapter board, is a third vear doctoral student at the U of A where he is a conducting student of Dr. Bruce Chamberlain and an organ student of Dr. Pamela Decker. He also serves as Organist/ Director of Music for St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Tucson. Prior to arriving in Arizona. Doug served churches in Wilmington, North Carolina, and Venice. Florida as well as serving as chapter dean

for his local AGO chapters. He is a published composer and recitalist having concertized primarily on the east coast and in the Midwest. In 2008 he was featured with the Wilmington (NC) Symphony Orchestra performing "Symphony No. 3" of Camille Saint-Saëns and "Symphonie Concertante" of Joseph Jongen on First Presbyterian's historic 1928 E. M. Skinner pipe organ (Op. 713). Other recent solo performances include the After Noon Concert Series at Princeton University Chapel in Princeton, New Jersey.

A native of Portsmouth, Ohio, he is a graduate of the University of Kentucky in Lexington where he was an organ student of Arnold Blackburn. He holds the Master of Music degree in church music from Westminster Choir College, where he was a conducting student of Allen Crowell and Joseph Flummerfelt and an organ student of Joan Lippincott.



He previously served with the Catholic Knoxville Tennessee Diocese, which included serving as the Director of Music and Organist for Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church. From June 2010-May 2011. Will was the music Intern

for West End United Methodist Church in Nashville, TN.

Will holds the Bachelor of Music degree in Sacred Music from Carson-Newman University and the Master of Music Degree in Organ Performance from the University of Tennessee Knoxville. An active recitalist, Will has given several solo concerts across the country. His organ teachers have included Polly Brecht, Michael Velting, J. Ryan Garber, John Brock, Dennis Kenne, Jon Gillock, and Pamela Decker.

AGO National Survey Results

According national headquarters, more than 4,300 members, former members, and non-members have responded to the survey distributed in mid-October. National's intention is to use the garnered information for guidance in efforts to improve the AGO membership experience.

Some interesting preliminary findings suggest that:

- 80% of current members were paid for playing the organ in a religious institution last year.
- 40% of current members report earning the highest percentage of their income in fields other than music, even if they also play in a church or synagogue.
- 22% of former members report that their work at religious institutions generates the largest percentage of their income.
- 93% of retired organists enjoy attending organ recitals

formances in almost every country in Western Europe. He has fifteen CD recordings to his credit.

Out of the Desert and Beyond: the Music of Jay Vosk

February 22, 2015, 3 p.m. Our Savior's Lutheran church

The music of Tucson composer Jay Vosk will be featured in a program at Our Savior's Lutheran Church. The program will include *Songs of Creation for Native Flute and Organ* and *And the Idols Shall Suddenly Pass* for solo organ with David Gay as organist and Linda Doughty, the Native flutist.

The concert includes five new Vosk pieces: Bouncing Etudes for Solo Timpani; Weaves of Grass for Violin Solo; The Old Woman and the Sparrow for Flute, Clarinet, and narrator; Sonatina for Tenor Saxophone and Marimba; and Four Scottish Songs for Soprano Voice and Soprano Saxophone. The performances of all five of these pieces will be world premieres. Musicians will be Jay Vosk, saxophone; Barbara Freischlad, percussion, David Rife, violin; Dominic Lavigny, clarinet; and Clare Demer, soprano.

Songs of Creation, based on a Hohokam Indian legend, was commissioned by Maryjim Thoene and recorded on Raven Records by Ms. Thoene. The work has received numerous performances including a well received rendition of the work by Mr. Gay and Ms. Doughty at the 2008 AGO Midwinter Conclave hosted by the Southern Arizona chapter. And the Idols, a tone poem based on verses from The Book of Isaiah, was commissioned by David and Ilona Vukovic Gay and premiered at the chapter's Showcase Concert in 2011.

Notes and photos from October hymn sing. . . .

Those who gathered for the recent hymn sing were rewarded with the singing of some of the most vigorous and lasting hymns in our hymnals. Jeffrey Campbell, Steve Keyl, Michael Koss, Lynn Moser and David Wachter served as organists, accompanying about ten hymns. A highlight was Michael Koss's brief presentation regarding our National Anthem since this year is the 200th anniversary of its composition. Michael even displayed a United States flag with 15 stars and 15 strips. Hearing the story of its composition gave new meaning to Francis Scott Keys poetry. The program concluded with Steve Keyl playing one of the variations from Dudley Buck's Concert Variations on "The Star-Spangled Banner." Kudos to all who participated.

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
