The Organ Wars of Paris—The quarrel that just won't go away Jesse Eschbach

Saturday, October 14,10 a.m. Northminster Presbyterian Church

Light lunch following the presentation.

This presentation by Dr. Jesse Eschbach will give us a glimpse into the fractious split in the French organ world pitting 'reformers' Norbert Dufourcq, André Marchal and organ builder Victor Gonzalez against the traditionalists, Charles-Marie Widor and Marcel Dupré. This split culminated in a tragic rupture between Dupré and the famed Jeanne Demessieux. The presentation will be based on Dr. Eshbach's research into Jeanne Demessieux's diaries as well as recollections of Marcel Dupre's granddaughter and events witnessed by Marie-Madeleine Duruflé.

Dr. Eschbach is the past chair of the division of keyboard studies for the College of Music at the University of North Texas and has served as a faculty member since 1986. Eschbach holds a doctorate of musical arts degree from the University of Michigan where he was a student of Robert Glasgow.

Pamela Decker, Organ Roy Johnson Memorial Organ Series

Dr. Decker will present a program entitled "A Kaleidoscope of Song and Dance." This program will present dance works and lyrical song-like pieces by American and British composers of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Composers include Calvin Hampton, Herbert Bielawa, Charles Villiers Stanford, Gerald Near, Ken Yukl, and Pamela



Decker. The chosen works display dance rhythms and song influences that trace back to origins in Spain, France, England, South American, Africa, and the United States.

The concluding work will be Pamela Decker's Passacaglia and Dance Variations, which was world premiered on July 13, 2023, in the final concert of the American Guild of Organists' West Region Convention in Portland, Oregon, with choreography and dance by the Oregon Ballet Theatre.

Pamela, who is U of A professor of organ and theory, holds the DMA from Stanford University and studied both organ and composition as a Fulbright Scholar in Germany. She has won prizes in national and international competitions for organ and composition and has performed extensively as a concert organist throughout the United States, Canada and Europe.




Roy Johnson Memorial Scholarship



Discovering an organ gem: Pacific Northwest Odyssey


Back in July as we were traveling around the Pacific Northwest for 28 days, we were advised by our friend David Dahl, professor emeritus at Pacific Lutheran University that we should if at all possible take a detour as we were heading south for the Shakespeare Festival in Ashland, OR. So before driving our car onto the Cathlamet/Westport ferry, we made a stop at Our Saviors Lutheran Church nestled out in the country in what we were told was a Scandinavian enclave dating from the 19th c. resultant from the wave of immigration from Norway and Sweden. Bill was particularly interested in seeing the organ there since the only extant examples of Hilbourne Roosevelt's work were "east of the Adirondacks", including his pipework at Crouse Hall, Syracuse University where Bill did graduate work.

The organ at the church was built by Hilbourne L. Roosevelt in 1885. He and his brother Frank (cousins of FDR and Teddy) built some of the largest organs in the United States during their career, and many are still prized today for their quality and tone. The company was in operation until 1893. The Roosevelt brothers were among the first to introduce electricity into organ building.

We had a delightful two hours playing this pristine instrument. Wesley's "Lead Me Lord" and "Wash Me Throughly" as arranged by G. Winston Cassler sounded particularly charming on this beautiful example of 19th c. American organ building at its best.

Don't miss it if you're ever driving in the area.


Pamela Decker premiered her newest commissioned work, *Passacaglia and Dance Variations*, with choreography and dance by the Oregon Ballet Theatre, on July 13, 2023, in the final concert of the American Guild of Organists' West Region Convention. Pamela says that the composition is a 10-minute piece which develops from a haunting melodic ground bass theme (in a transformed Phrygian mode) and grows into an evolving procession of dances from many parts of the world, all with the presence of the melodic and harmonic implications of the primary theme. Leading up to her commissioned work were dance-based works and lyrical, song-like pieces by American, British, and Russian composers. The chosen works display

influences that trace back to origins in Spain, France, England, South America, Africa, and the United States. *Congratulations, Pamela!*

Steve Keyl—In from the Heat

Steve Keyl performed on Catalina United Methodist's "In from the Heat" series on July 15. An audience of about 75 heard settings of hymns, chants, and chorales from the 16th through 21st centuries on Catalina's four-manual Quimby organ. Featured were "Three Preludes on Welsh Hymn Tunes" by Ralph Vaughan Williams, "Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern" by contemporary Dutch composer Bert Matter, and "Concert Variations on the Austrian Hymn" by the 19th-century American virtuoso John Knowles Paine, featuring a bravura pedal variation and closing fugue.

The program also included some early music: "Da pacem, Domine" by Arnolt Schlick and "Jesus Christus, unser Heiland" by Franz Tunder, who was Buxtehude's father-in-law and predecessor in Lübeck. As usual, a fine lunch preceded the concert.
