When that church closed, the organ was sold, dismantled, moved, and installed in the beautiful sanctuary at St. Andrew's in the fall of 2008. The program features a massed choir from many churches in Sierra Vista, a high school choir, and robust congregational hymn singing.

message from the dean...

Friends and Colleagues,

Playing Well-Tempered to Be Better Tempered

My message last month got me thinking more about J. S. Bach and his attitudes, especially his work ethic "Whoever is equally industrious will succeed equally well." Much of my life, I've looked upon his overall compositional output as a sort of Musical Mount Everest including awe-inspiring works, such as his Trio Sonatas, that seem almost beyond my reach. After reflecting upon some quotes by him or about him, however, I've started thinking about him a little differently and playing at least something by him every single day.

For several months (or is it years?) I've had students playing his Prelude in C from the first book of the Well-Tempered Clavier and playing it myself has become a sort of calming/centering ritual. By now, of course, I play it from memory at a moderate tempo, but slower if I feel I need to calm myself. But recently, remembering that Baroque pitch was a little lower than it is now, I've started playing it, still from memory, but sometimes in C-flat major or even B-flat major (I'll be going further afield in the days and weeks to come). And for a brighter character, transpose it to C-sharp major just pretending it has that key signature (and adjusting the specific accidentals of course).

In recent years, several excellent biographies about Frédéric Chopin have appeared, and he was

certainly familiar with Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier. Although he didn't perform them in public, one of his students recounted a lesson during which Chopin played five preludes and fugues. And for his famous sojourn to Mallorca, where he composed his 24 Preludes, he brought along not only manuscript paper, but also the Well-Tempered Clavier.

A bit over a century later, the 'cellist Pablo Casals would start his day at the piano playing from the WTC. The music became so familiar that his housekeeper would sing fugue subjects the way others might sing popular songs. And Chopin's contemporary Robert Schumann wrote: "Let The Well-Tempered Clavier be your daily bread. Then you will certainly become a solid musician."

So, I've started doing just that, playing at least something from the '48' every day as my daily bread. I highly recommend others adopt the habit. Playing through a Prelude, or a Prelude and Fugue, or a couple, each day is well worth the time. Some are very familiar... close friends in a sense. But sometimes, turning the page brings a refreshing encounter with one I don't recall ever hearing before... making new friends.

Professor Kuhlman will touch on a few of the builders and teachers of organ who were vanguards in realizing these "reforms" during these "golden" years.

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, railroad companies used organ recitals to develop tourism and motivate people to ride the rails. Travel itineraries west to California often included a visit to the Tabernacle organ at Temple Square in Salt Lake City where there was a daily organ



recital series. Other cities followed suit and organs became a status symbol of culture and refinement.

Meet your 2024-2026 chapter officers

We continue introducing you to our current chapter officers, some of whom have held their offices for more than one term and some of whom are new. This month we introduce you to Lars Andersen, Fern Hieb and Mark Stockwell.

Lars Andersen, Membership, Placement

Lars has been a professional church organist since 1961. He began organ study following six year of piano study, studying with the late Charles Shaffer and obtained his first church position during his first year with Shaffer. Later, he studied Dr. Justin Colyar.



He has devoted most of his years in the Lutheran church,

beginning in Santa Ana, (CA) and followed by 31 years as organist at Dove of Peace Lutheran Church. He was senior organist from 1989-1992 at St. Thomas the Apostle Catholic church when he accompanied the church choir on a pilgrimage to Europe where he played for the Pentecost Mass at St. Peter's in Rome and for Trinity Mass at the Dom Cathedral in Salzburg, Austria, where Mozart had served as organist. Additionally, he has played the Mormon Tabernacle Organ and performed a concert at Jørlunde Kirke, in Jørlunde, Denmark in 2010.

Lars has been Organist/Pianist at Tanque Verde Lutheran Church since September 2016 where he plays for the Sunday morning worship service, and the Saturday 5 p.m. service where he sometimes serves as cantor.

Fern Hieb, Advertising

Fern Hieb, CAGO, has a master's degree in organ performance from Washington University in St. Louis, MO, where she studied organ with Howard Kelsey and performed in master classes with Peter Hurford and Geraint Jones. She has held church music positions in Kansas, Illinois, Missouri, Massachusetts and



Tucson, Arizona, and played recitals throughout her

career. She served as Dean of both the St. Louis Chapter and the Southern Arizona Chapter of the AGO and was one of the co-chairs of the 2008 AGO Regional Convention held in Tucson.

Fern also holds a master's degree in library and information science from Simmons College in Boston, MA. She is the founder of Flourish, a music cataloging business that serves academic, conservatory and public libraries.

Having sold the cataloging business and retired from the church organist profession, Fern now spends her time in volunteer projects at the Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona and at Shalom Mennonite Fellowship. She and her husband, Barry, are making plans to move to Lafayette, Indiana, to live closer to family.

Mark Stockwell, Member at Large

Mark holds the BS
Mechanical Engineering with
multiple engineering minors
and a Linguistics minor from
Michigan State University. He
also completed a BS in
Computer Engineering from
PCC and UofA, and
Secondary Certification in
Education from PCC. He
worked many years in tech
industries as a Robotics and



Automation engineer, and in 2010 became a high school teacher teaching Engineering Science, Physics, and STEM courses.

Mark's interest in Baroque organ music was planted in high school in Bavaria, then increased when he attended a Virgil Fox organ concert in 1979 at MSU. He began organ lessons at MSU in Fall 1981, then moved to Tucson with IBM in June 1982 and, according to him, "found a great organ professor who was willing to take a chance on an unworthy new organ student as his pupil, Dr. Roy Johnson." Sometime in the 80s and early 90s, he was a member of SAAGO, but not active.

In 1988, he MIDI-ized an old 2-manual 32 pedal analog organ and added a MIDI keyboard to it. Four years ago, he began building a totally digital classical organ console which he calls the MIDI-Aftertouch-Recordable-Console-System or MARCS. He has two fantastic children who are successfully launched and prosperous. Mark hopes he can be of assistance to SAAGO as a Member at Large.

The AGO's new database and website are now officially live





TOCCATA AND FUGUE IN F MAJOR

Dietrich Buxtehude (1637-1707)

The first part of this work is a toccata-like introduction in a majestic style with sharp contrasts between different manuals and long melodic configurations around various pedal notes. The fugue has a short and witty theme and builds up to a grand climax.

TWO FANTASIES ON FLEMISH CHRISTMAS SONGS

Dr. John Bull (1563-1628)

- Lact ons mit herten reyne, loven dat sute kindekeyn (Let us with pure hearts, adore the sweet little Child)
- b. Een Kindekeyn is ons geboren (A little Child is born)

Both Fantasies were composed during Bull's sojourn in Antwerp where he was organist at the cathedral. They express the character of each tune in a remarkable way and are very fine examples of late-Ren-aissance art.

PRELUDE AND FUGUE IN B MINOR

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

This work displays lyrical as well as dramatic feeling. The prelude is built on two themes played on contrasting manuals. The Fugue, too, is bi-thematic. The first theme is a pattern of ascending and descending quavers; the second, in the form of a broken chord, appears at the end of the work and provides a striking contrast to the smooth flowing character of the first theme.

THREE SCHÜBLER CHORALE PRELUDES

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

These three transcriptions of earlier cantatas were published around 1746 by the publisher Schübler in Zelle.

- a. Wake, awake, for night is flying cantus firmus in the tenor
- b. My soul doth magnify the Lord cantus firmus in the soprano
- c. Comest Thou down, Jesus, from heaven cantus firmus in the alto, played on a pedal 4' stop

PIÈCE HÉROÏQUE

Cesar Franch

Franck wrote this work in memory of his pupils killed in the France-Prussian war of 1870. It represents, emotionally, a continuous development through struggles and darkness towards the splendor and light of the conclusion. Two themes are used; the heroic subject appearing at the beginning beneath the urge of the repeated chords, and a contrasting melody in the major key which forms the peroration.

This work was composed in 1940 in the beginning of the German occupation. The weal and woe of modern man is reflected here in a polyphonic tone-pattern, full of dynamics. The Allegro is written in the classical sonate-form with two major themes and a third one acting as a bridge between them. The Adagio is a trio in canon form with two sections, the second being a reversed variation of the first. The Fantasy has two contrasting themes which are treated one after the other. The Fugue has a witty "Eulenspiegel" melody as the first theme and a contemplative and expressive second theme. Later a third theme joins these two and the composition ends in a synthesis of life and struggle.
