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Message from the dean...

Dear Colleagues,

The recent anniversary of the death of my partner... the news of a friend less than half my age being put into hospice care... sharing a concert on the Roy Johnson Memorial organ... How do things tie together? Not just 'How do these things tie together,' but how do things tie together at all? (This was not at all the direction I would have anticipated for this month's column).

The recent Member's Recital really helped tie things together. Most of the time while I'm accompanying congregational singing, I am focused upon keeping my own playing flowing rhythmically and perhaps changing up the pedal part or re-harmonizing a little bit either in the introduction and/or later verses. But to actually sing the text (for a change!) during the Member's Recital gave me a different perspective and new insight(s) to congregational hymns. All too often, I think of each verse separately, but singing all the verses in order clarifies how often the verses combine to relate a stronger message than each verse relates by itself.

Each and every day I need to spend some time at the piano and/or the organ, and sometimes more than once. In a very real sense, it's my Musical Self Therapy. Part of that time on the keys is spent reviewing hymn tune settings, or exploring new ones, to select things for upcoming services. But, beyond the titles, I rarely think of the text. Instead, I'm thinking about whether the melody would be familiar to the congregation. I'm also thinking about the harmonies, and the character of the setting... would this be good for a postlude, or a communion meditation? But after singing as part of the 'congregation' at the Members Recital, I'm going to start paying more attention to the text. I'm sure it will enhance the therapeutical value of my time at the keyboard or at the console.

I consulted that same World Book Dictionary that gave me inspiration for my previous column, and because of papers tucked between its pages, it opened right to the page with "console." Perhaps it's appropriate that organists engage the console as a noun to console as a verb.

Jeffrey Campbell, Associate Music Director and Organist at St. Philip's In the Hills Episcopal Church, and Stephen Keyl, retired Director of Music at St. Alban's, will collaborate in a complete performance of Bach's 'Great Eighteen" chorales in St. Alban's Organ Concert Series.

The "Great Eighteen" are a group of ambitious, large-scale

organ works based on Lutheran chorales, which are considered the cornerstone of the organ repertory. Bach assembled them toward the end of his life from pieces he had written years earlier, revising and in some cases expanding them, perhaps intending to have them printed. Many are favorites with organists and audiences, such as the brilliant fantasia on "Come, Holy



Ghost" for full organ, the lyrical "Savior of the Nations, Come," and the quietly moving "Before Thy Throne I Now Appear," said to have been revised by the composer shortly before he died.

An Interfaith choir and orchestra, hosted by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, presents Rob Garner's Oratorio, entitled *Lamb of God*, a dramatic musical portrayal of the final days of Jesus' life. The work was completed in 2010 and recorded with the London Symphony Orchestra that same year. A unique aspect of this work is that in addition to the soloists, choir, orchestra and spoken narration, there is no vocal soloist depicting Christ, but instead his voice is always represented by a solo cello.

Each year, an estimated 4,000+ performers across the world participate in locally-produced performances of "Lamb of God" in places as farreaching as the Netherlands, Romania and Buenos Aires. These performances play for a total audience of well over 50,000 people from dozens of faiths.





Roy Johnson Memorial Scholarship


Students may apply for a scholarship!

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

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The Wanamaker Organ—its last public day. . .

Member Larry Grove visited Philadelphia to hear the Wanamaker organ—the world's largest—for its final day of public performance: March 22. Here he shares some interesting observations and some great personal photos culled from his visit on that day.

From Larry:

The Wanamaker Building in Center City Philadelphia has been the home of major department stores since its opening in 1911. The 13-story building, which covers an entire city block, was built by John Wanamaker in the early 1900s. During its construction he purchased the then world's largest pipe organ from the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair and had it brought to Philadelphia in 13 rail cars where it was installed in the seven-story Grand Court in the center of the store.

The organ was first played when the store opened in 1911. Since then, it has been played every day at least twice a day from Monday through Saturday. John Wanamaker was a religious man who kept the store closed on Sundays; in recent years, however, when the store has been open on Sundays,



the organ was not played out of respect for the Wanamaker.

After the organ was first used in 1911, in spite of its size, it was deemed not large enough for the space, so from 1911 through the 1930s the organ was continually enlarged by the addition of pipes made in the Wanamaker organ shop, which is still maintained in the Wanamaker Building.

The Wanamaker Store closed in the 1980s, but was followed by Hecht's, Strawbridge & Clothier, Lord &

Taylor and finally Macy's for the past 20 years. Recently, only three of the seven floors remained as the department store retail space. The upper floors were all converted to office space. You can read everything about the organ on this website: Wanamaker Organ - Wikipedia

During Macy's tenure in the building, the company brought the organ back to 100% playing capacity. It had fallen into poor condition in the late 1980s to 1990s. This past January Macy's announced the

store would be closed in March because of declining sales, shoplifting and lack of profitability. The store closed for good on Sunday, March 23. On Saturday, March 22, a "goodbye" celebration of the organ was held with all-day concerts beginning at 9 am and ending at 6:30 pm with a different organist playing a concert every hour on the hour throughout the day.

It is not known, when, if ever, the organ will again be played in public. It and the Grand Court are listed on

the National Register of Historic Places, so they cannot be changed, although the building will be repurposed.

With the current retail environment there will never be another major department store in the building, so how the building will be repurposed is unknown. The building's owner has pledged to keep the organ and Grand Court intact.

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


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
