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Message from the dean...

Inspiration

Dear Colleagues,

For me, the month of February held three recitals that I found inspiring. But the idea that these performances were 'inspiring' brought to mind the question: What does inspiration mean? Looking it up seemed like a good way to get started on writing this column. So I went to the bookshelf, itself archaic I suppose, to consult an actual book, a 'Dictionary,' rather than Google or Siri. This particular one is a two-volume dictionary that's part of a World Book encyclopedia set that I inherited several years ago, but have never actually used. I was surprised to find papers in between some of its pages, such a bulletin from a 1979 memorial service, but that's another story... Back to the question, what does inspiration mean?

"Inspiration" (I'll skip the phonetic pronunciation) "n. 1. the influence of thought and strong feelings on actions, especially good actions..."

The three performances were inspiring partly because of the seemingly effortless mastery of the performers, but also because of their choice of works to perform and their commentary. First was Doug Leightenheimer's recital in Holsclaw Hall as part of the Roy Johnson Memorial Organ Series. Since organists are usually occupied simultaneously, it was great to hear Doug play not just a couple pieces during a service, or in a showcase, but an entire solo recital. The performance and the choice of repertoire made for an uplifting and energizing afternoon.

A couple weeks later, the concert pianist Rachel Breen, presented a concert on Centennial Hall

Stage. Both the performer and the audience were on stage, surrounded by the shell that usually would be behind a large ensemble in performance, so it was a much more intimate experience for the audience than a typical artist recital. Her playing is stunning, with amazing clarity in dynamic layers and contrasts. She played some exceptionally difficult repertoire as if it were child's play, but in such a communicative way that spell-binding is an apt description of her performance.

The third inspiring performance was that of Alcée Chriss III as part of the Catalina Organ Festival. His concert was another spell-binding performance of effortless mastery. His registrations had such clarity and colorfulness that it seemed like I was hearing that instrument for the very first time. And like the earlier inspiring concerts I attended, time flew by as my attention was entirely captured by the performance. As I walked back to my car that evening, I felt that I had breathed in new energy, I had breathed in Music, I had been inspired.

So, if inspiration is "the influence of thought and strong feelings on actions, especially good actions..." what actions should follow? Hearing Rachel Breen and Alcée Chriss both perform from memory inspires me to memorize or re-memorize more pieces. But all three performers inspire me to be more communicative with my music making. They inspire me to prepare music that is worthy of inspiring others. And who knows, maybe start memorizing... the Widor Toccata perhaps?

Jeffrey Campbell, Associate Music Director and Organist at St. Philip's In the Hills Episcopal Church, and Stephen Keyl, retired Director of Music at St. Alban's, will collaborate in a complete performance of Bach's "Great Eighteen" chorales in St. Alban's Organ Concert Series.

The "Great Eighteen" are a group of ambitious, large-scale organ works based on Lutheran chorales, which are considered the cornerstone of the organ repertory. Bach assembled

them toward the end of his life from pieces he had written years earlier, revising and in some cases expanding them, perhaps intending to have them printed. Many are favorites with organists and audiences, such as the brilliant fantasia on "Come, Holy Ghost" for full organ, the lyrical "Savior of the Nations, Come," and



the quietly moving "Before Thy Throne I Now Appear," said to have been revised by the composer shortly before he died.

SAAGO—Valerie Harris, How the West was Won. Rescheduled to next season, 2025-2026

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Frederich Julius Reubke (1834-58), son of an organist and student of Liszt, composed two major works, the *Piano Sonata in B-flat minor*, and the *Sonata on the 94th Psalm in C minor* for organ, which is considered one of the great pieces for solo organ of the Romantic repertoire. He died from tuberculosis in June of 1858.
