Our Annual Showcase displays the talents of SAAGO members and this year features Jeffrey Campbell, Ji Sun Lee and Jeffrey Hall. This is always a special program which displays their artistry as well as some of the organ repertoire's most beautiful music. This year's concert takes place at St. Philip's in the Hills with the performers playing the 1986 Holtkamp organ (III/47), which has revisions and enlargement by



Hupalo & Repasky Pipe Organs and a new console by Quimby Pipe Organs, Inc. The instrument is dedicated to Andrew Buchhauser (1910-1999), Organist at St. Philip's from 1947 to 1986, and long-time director of the U of A School of Music as well as past dean of SAAGO.

Jeffrey Campbell, DMus, ARCCO, has distinguished himself as an organ recitalist, choral conductor, and clinician. A graduate of the University of British Columbia and Northwestern University, Dr. Campbell has specialized in the interpretation of Bach's organ and choral music, as well as English and French Romantic repertoire. Since August 2001, he has been Associate Music Director and Principal Organist at the Episcopal Church of Saint Philip's in the Hills. He has been a featured recitalist at several AGO Regional Conventions and played in concert series here and abroad. He has accompanied the Saint Philip's Choirs on four UK Residencies to English Cathedrals, providing the daily round of music, as has been sung in these great spaces for centuries.

Jeffrey Hall and his wife Schenley moved to Tucson in November 2024 after 32 years in Flagstaff, where Jeff worked at Lowell Observatory, serving from 2010 to 2024 as its Executive Director. Jeff holds a B.A. in Physics from



Message from the dean...

Dear Colleagues,

An absolutely delightful season of organ events has begun. For many of these events we need to congratulate our Programs Committee... Bravo! The service that was our opening general meeting of the year was full of marvelous music (I for one immediately ordered the collection from which Ji-Sun's piece came, and plan to use it as my Postlude soon, as well as other pieces from the collection even as soon as this coming Sunday). As I write this, I am still looking forward to the SAAGO Showcase recital, but the two events this weekend, David Gay's presentation and Guy Whatley's recital at St. Alban's, were really inspiring, each in their own way, and I don't use the word 'inspiring' lightly.

First, David's presentation about Organs in the Gadsden Purchase was encouraging in perhaps unexpected ways. Learning about the long history of pipe organs here in Southern Arizona made me feel proud to be part of a community of musicians who are part of a legacy that stretches back into the nineteenth century, and beyond. The pictures and stories from the past few years also encouraged me to think that the legacy continues, and not only will a variety of excellent instruments remain, and slowly proliferate, in the region, but that there will continue to be musicians both native and transplanted that will carry this musical legacy forward. The number of world renowned organists how have performed in Tucson also reminds me that we are not in some sort of remote backwater, but rather fully a part of the world's cultural life for well over a century.

Guy Whatley's recital at St. Alban's on October 12th was a case in point. Both the instrument and his

choice of repertoire highlighted how much we can celebrate being part of a living legacy with deep roots. Perhaps I am not alone if I confess that during some performances either my mind starts to wander, or worse, especially after a long day, the performance may become soporific (how often can one use that word?!). But Dr. Whatley's performance and programming had the opposite effect! In his performance, the rhythmic flow and subtle rhythmic inflections, going well beyond mere articulations, are so compelling that the it is almost impossible to drift off... instead the listener is carried along at every moment. I also appreciate the way his commentary between pieces is insightful without ever seeming pedantic; his comments about Bach's 'Fantasy and Fugue in G minor' from 1720 profoundly deepened my appreciation of the work. His performance and commentary also reminded me that J. S. Bach's music is almost always not just musically challenging, but profoundly communicative both emotionally and spiritually.

The two events I've been writing about were both on the same weekend, and yet there are many future performances on the calendar as well. I'm trying to adopt a new strategy of attending at least one performance a week whether it's an organ recital, or some other professional level event such as the Tucson Symphony Orchestra, or a performance at the University of Arizona, or at Pima Community College. So hopefully we will be running into one another frequently this season. See you soon, at the SAAGO Showcase...

Jeff Hall continued: from Penn State. He studied organ in high school and in graduate school as a welcome change of pace from all the astronomy, and he served as assistant organist at The Episcopal Church of the Epiphany throughout his time in Flagstaff. He has also enjoyed using his home studio over the years to create synthesizer realizations of his original ragtime as well as of works ranging from Bach's Art of Fugue to Terry Riley's In C. He presently serves as a tenor in the Choir of Saint Philip's in the Hills.

Ji Sun Lee, a South Korean born pianist/ organist, and church musician, has performed in South Korea, United States, Brazil, Germany, and Italy. She has won top prizes in several competitions, including first prizes in the UA President's Concerto Competition and the Contemporary Music Society Competition at ASU. She has performed as guest artist at the New American Piano Series, ASU, and also in Brazil including Villa Lobos Institute-Uni Rio, performing and giving master classes. Lee holds degrees from Presbyterian College, S. Korea, ASU, and the U of A. She studied organ with Pamela Decker, Robert Clark, and So-In Park, and piano at the UA with Nicholas Zumbro. Dr. Lee has taught at Cochise College, the U of A, Biola University, and Azusa Pacific University, and served as a church musician in S. Korea and the US. She serves as Director of Music at St. Alban's Episcopal Church.



Recap—Organs of the Gadsden Purchase

On Saturday, October 11, David Gay and Stan Kartchner presented an excellent program at Northminster Presbyterian Church. Originally featured at the Chapter's 2013 Opening Program when David discussed "Organs of Southern Arizona," the newly revised program included additional information on the history of pipe organs in the Gadsden Purchase. It was accompanied with historic pictures, musical examples, and detailed descriptions of the more than eighty pipe organs installed or rebuilt in Tucson, Bisbee, Casa Grande, Douglas, Green Valley, Morenci, Sierra Vista, Somerton, and Yuma from 1889 to 2019.

The first pipe organ, a 2-manual 9-rank Pilcher made in Louisville, KY, was transported to Tucson in 1889 by the recently opened Southern Pacific Railroad and installed at Grace Episcopal Church, then located on Jackson St. and Stone. The oldest pipe organ in Southern Arizona still in use is the 1903 Murray-Harris 2-manual 15-rank pipe organ in Covenant Presbyterian Church in Bisbee. David also noted the twenty-nine instruments located in Tucson, Bisbee, Casa Grande, and Sierra Vista which were either installed or rebuilt by local pipe organ builder David McDowell between 1947 and 1991.

The program ended with enthusiastic applause. Members then enjoyed social time and a delicious luncheon prepared by Dee Schultz.
