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Message from the dean...

Dear Friends and Colleagues:

Little by little, it's getting easier, but when I start composing a monthly Dean's Message, I usually feel very unequal to the task. I draw some inspiration from what I remember about a recent Premier of Iceland. She felt inadequate to the position, but ran for election anyway, and then grew into her elected governmental role.

Why Iceland here? Even though I myself haven't (yet) visited, my father, a wildlife biologist (and ornithologist in particular) visited at least a couple of times. And so, I became aware of many fascinating aspects of that nation. As a stamp collector, I was already aware of the long, 1000+ year history, and the relationship with Denmark, but I was fascinated to learn that the entire nation, at least at that time, had just a single phone book, and everyone was listed by their first name. Interestingly, they don't use surnames the way we do either; I would be known as Raymond Ronaldsson, and my sister as Helen Ronaldsdottir. I might seem to ramble on, but if a recent national figure in Iceland could step up to her elected position, I should be able to compose my monthly Dean's Message.

Late this summer, I took a road trip to visit family in Colorado and Wyoming, and attend my high school's 50-year+ Alumni Brunch. It's basically an annual tradition for me to relax, to re-connect, to reflect, and to rejuvenate. Bear in mind, the population of the entire state of Wyoming (576,851 in 2020) is less than that of Pima county (1,043,433), and Iceland has even fewer people than either (393,396). So, naturally, I very much look forward to each of my visits to Colorado and Wyoming.

This year's road trip, however, included a couple unexpected road bumps; one almost literally. Within a few hours of my trip, I realized that I had forgotten to put my laptop in the car. And then, less than an hour later, I encountered a heavy monsoon

downpour. I had reservations for the night at the Best Western in Socorro, NM, and was within an hour of reaching my destination. But then, I noticed some debris on the interstate up ahead. I was already traveling well below the speed limit, but didn't brake or swerve because of the rain. So I aimed to drive over the middle of the debris. It struck my car with some force, however, which was a little unnerving, but no warning lights came on, and I was able to keep driving. Once I arrived in Socorro, the rain stopped, I settled in for the night, and phoned my insurance company.

Meanwhile, back to the laptop, I had decided that I would need to drive back to Tucson to get it. Then I had the brilliant idea that a friend with my house key could retrieve the laptop and start driving to New Mexico so that we could meet part way and save me some driving time. He had a far more brilliant idea: send the laptop to myself via FedEx! So he did that. It arrived at my hotel in Colorado a few hours before I did.

To shorten this somewhat long, convoluted saga (notice the Icelandic reference), once I was back in Tucson, I followed through with my insurance company's guidelines and took the car into the shop. Unfortunately, the insurance company decided that my 2014 Ford C-Max hybrid was a total loss. I anticipate being in a new(er) vehicle well before any of you are reading this, so who knows what I'll be driving when I see you next? Meanwhile, I'm very much looking forward to having all of this behind me (as well as the six deaths in less than four weeks that started my summer... but that's a whole different saga!).

So let's embark upon a season of renewal, and new beginnings!

Dr. Harris presents a workshop on using *ForScore*, the sheet music digital app which allows musicians to organize their music libraries digitally and to turn pages via screen taps, custom gestures, or hands-free with a Bluetooth pedal. It also has practice aids which allow the performer to track practice time, set goals, and use features, such as a pitch pipe.

Everyone is invited to the 18th year of the Sierra Vista Hymn Fest at St. Andrew the Apostle Parish. St. Andrew's is home to the largest pipe organ in Cochise County, a 1948 Moller 3 manual, 30 rank instrument (1,750 pipes) which speaks into a large sanctuary and which has a superb orchestral Swell division. Recent upgrades include a Peterson Console Controller, and the completion of the 16' Spitzflute stop (digital) for the lowest 12 notes in the pedal division, a missing feature since its installation in 2007-08.



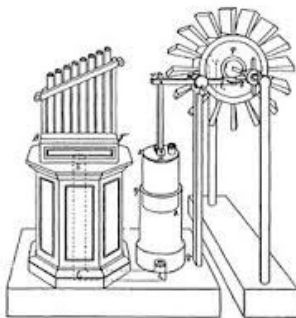

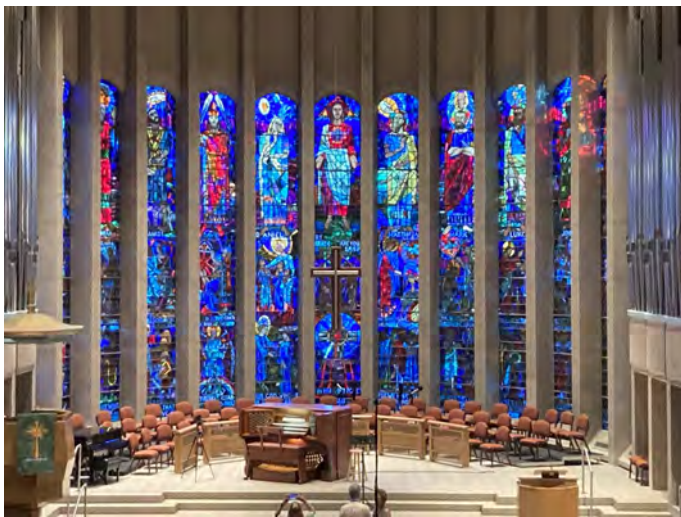
2026 Convention Reports

AGO National Convention St. Louis July 6-10, 2026

Nearly 900 organists gathered in St. Louis for the AGO National Convention, held from July 6-9, with additional open console organ tours available on the 10th. The opening concert featured Jan Kraybill performing a program celebrating America's 250th anniversary on the Principia College's 2005 III/56 Casavant Frères organ and joined by the Brass Ensemble of The United States Air Force Band of Mid-America. Other notable organists performing on a variety of excellent instruments kept us busy throughout the week. I especially enjoyed the hymn singing at Manchester United Methodist Church conducted by Mack Wilberg and featuring a large combined choir and orchestra and organist Richard Elliott playing the 2016 V/132 R.A. Colby hybrid pipe and digital organ. James Thomashower was honored for his 28 years as Executive Director of the AGO.

The workshops I attended were informative and well-presented, including George Stauffer's presentation focusing on his 2024 Oxford University Press book *J.S. Bach: The Organ Works*. I also enjoyed seeing and visiting with other members of our Chapter, including Pamela Decker, Ji-Sun Lee, and Douglas Leightenheimer. From my perspective, the convention was a rousing success and a worthwhile experience.

The Organ Historical Society Convention Philadelphia, August 11-14, 2026

Larry Grove and Pamela Decker attended the 70th anniversary convention of the Organ Historical Society in Philadelphia. There were 385 attendees, 13 outstanding venues and 15 exceptional performing artists during the convention. The convention hotel was the Courtyard by Marriott, Philadelphia City Avenue, where breakfast was served each morning and most meals at various venues throughout the convention.

A highlight of the convention was the world premiere performance of one of Pamela Decker's newest organ compositions: *Chaconne and Fugue* (2025), which was written in celebration of the Organ Historical Society's Platinum Jubilee and which was performed by Ken Cowan at the Kimmel Center on Thursday evening.

Patriotic Pipes Concert, Sierra Vista

St. Andrew the Apostle Church, Sierra Vista, presented its fourth annual Patriotic Pipes concert on July 10 in celebration of our nation's 250th anniversary with the theme "A Salute to America," presented by the Seipp/Fickley organ and trumpet duo from Washington, D.C. With an audience of about 180 people, the program included moving patriotic music performed by Todd Fickley on the 1949 Moeller pipe organ and accompanied by Chuck Seipp, trumpeter, including reverent hymns sung by the audience.

The local Knights of Columbus council provided an Honor Guard to present the Colors and the concert

began with Copland's *Fanfare for the Common Man*, followed by the National Anthem. The live music was synchronized to a projected video for each piece played, which included *Shenandoah*, Barber's *Adagio*, Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue* (on piano), a D-Day tribute, a moving rendition of *Mansions of the Lord, America, Battle Hymn of the Republic* and the traditional Armed Forces Salute with the active duty military members and veterans standing for their appropriate branch song. Ther finale featured a rousing Sousa March and the crowd-pleasing Berlin favorite, *God Bless America*. SAAGO members Rebecca Williams and John Hill coordinated the program.

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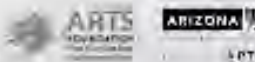

Dear SAAGO friends -

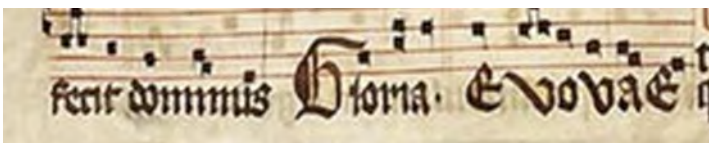
Some of you know I am a member of the Brotherhood of Saint Gregory, a religious community of men in the Episcopal Church. We are named after Saint Gregory the Great, who was Pope from 590 until his death in 604. Gregory is

known for his work to systematize and codify the music of the Roman Church in his day - taking the existing traditions of chant and making them the official music of the Church. This is what became known as *Gregorian Chant*. This music is still used to this day in Catholic, Episcopal, and a number of other churches, in various ways.

The BSG was founded in 1969, initially as a spiritual fellowship for church musicians. For this reason, St Gregory was chosen for the patron and namesake of the community - and our founder also adopted *Soli Deo Gloria* as the motto of the Brotherhood - also the motto of the AGO, taken from Johann Sebastian Bach! After several years, the Brotherhood's scope widened to welcome anyone who served the church, also in the spirit of Gregory, who was the first Pope to use the title *Servant of the Servants of God*. These two mottoes are our watchwords. To this day, among the varied ministries our brothers carry out, there continue to be a goodly number of church musicians among us.

I share this with you this month because of two special dates in our community, both in September: the first is September 3, when Gregory was ordained a Bishop, and the second is September 15, Holy Cross Day, the foundation day of the Brotherhood of St. Gregory. I assure you all of our prayers for you in the SAAGO, and throughout the world of church music, and I ask you to pray as well for us in our ministries.
